



"Christ our hope in life and death."

The Heidelberg Catechism (1563) was written less than 20 years after the death of Martin Luther. It comprises of **52 sets of questions & answers** – one for each 'Lord's Day' of the year. It summarises Protestant Reformed theology and stands as a solid framework on which the more familiar catechisms of the following century are based.

We are probably familiar with the first Q & A of the **Westminster Catechism** of 1646 (along with the identical 2^{nd} Q & A of the Baptist Catechism of 1689):

Q: What is the chief end of man. A: To glorify God and to enjoy Him for ever.

The Heidelberg Catechism **begins rather differently** but with a **most wonderful** question and answer:

Question 1. What is your only hope and comfort in life and death?

Answer: That I, with body and soul, both in life and in death, am not my own, but belong to my faithful Saviour Jesus Christ, who with His precious blood has fully satisfied for all my sins, and redeemed me from all the power of the devil; and so preserves me, that without the will of my Father in heaven not a hair can fall from my head; yes, that all things must work together for my salvation. Wherefore, by His Holy Spirit, He also assures me of eternal life, and makes me heartily willing and ready henceforth to live unto Him.

Just before the current 'lock down' a number of well-known contemporary hymn writers came together to write **a new hymn inspired by this lovely answer**. The words are shown below.
